## Report

## Background

- The council's voluntary and community sector commissioning programme 2013-14 demonstrates the continued commitment to invest in the voluntary and community sector (VCS). All commissioning opportunities are communicated through one section of the website, this shows:
  - tenders where it is decided to procure a service through the voluntary and community sector
  - grant opportunities including grants in kind
  - small community grants of up to £500 and capital community grants of up to £5000.
- 2. This report focuses only on the allocation of grant funding according to council outcomes. The smaller community grants will be awarded in April and October 2013.

## **Recommended grant awards**

- 3. This report recommends 14 grants to voluntary and community sector organisations, a total of £171,668. This figure is less than the total sum of grants awarded by Cabinet in March 2012. This is because a number of grant awards made in 2012 were on a longer term basis than twelve months. Further more there has been a move within the council's wider voluntary and community sector commissioning programme to procure some services through the sector rather than award grants.
- 4. Opportunities to apply for grant funding were advertised on the council's website on November 1<sup>st</sup> 2012 and promoted via a number of different mechanisms. A total of 22 applications were received by 20 organisations, seeking a total sum of £391, 476. The applications were assessed this year in line with the commissioning framework: small groups of officers met to assess applications according to outcome, and the relevant head of service has discussed the proposals with the portfolio holder.
- 5. The grant awards recommended by officers to Cabinet are attached at Appendix 1. Whilst they are set out according to primary outcome in the summary sheet of this report, it should be recognised that many of these grants will support activity that addresses multiple outcomes, and many seek to reduce inequalities.
- 6. This year the application process asked applicants if they paid the living wage to employees. This was not a criterion for funding and was for general information only. Of the 20 organisations that applied for funding, 14 pay the living wage of £7.45 in Norwich. A further 3 organisations were constituted of only volunteers and no paid employees.
- 7. Whilst the framework recommends longer term awards are made, officers have had regard to the council's medium term financial strategy and recommended the majority of awards are made for twelve months, with some on a two year basis.

- 8. In assessing applications against outcomes, officers have identified the following two gaps in provision:
  - Dance: The council has previously awarded grant funding to Norfolk Dance to provide cultural, educational and training opportunities to young people. In 2012 Norfolk Dance ceased to exist. The commissioning process did not result in applications for grant funding that addressed these needs. Officers seek approval to directly commission activity through the voluntary and community sector to meet this gap, in conjunction with The Garage. A sum of £7000 is set aside, in line with the previous year's grant award to Norfolk Dance.
  - Officers seek approval to directly commission activity to further support cultural diversity in the City. A sum of £2258 is set aside to achieve this.
