Give our community a greater say in the licensing of lap dancing clubs

We, the undersigned, call on **Norwich City Council** to pass a resolution adopting Schedule 3 to the Local Government (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act (LGMPA) 1982, as amended by the Policing and Crime Act 2009.

At present, lap dancing clubs are licensed in the same way as cafes and restaurants. But lap dancing clubs are part of the sex industry, not the ordinary leisure industry.

By adopting Schedule 3 **Norwich City Council** will be able to stop licensing lap dancing clubs like cafes and start applying necessary controls and regulations to the clubs. By adopting Schedule 3, local people will also be given a greater say in the licensing process.

I should be dismayed if my daughter or nieces were to work in such places. I think it is profoundly demeaning for viewer and viewed. What is perfectly acceptable between consenting adults in private should not automatically be assumed to be so in paying public places.

Dear Sirs,

As city centre residents, my family has experienced over the past six years how difficult it is to limit the spread of licensed premises beyond the city's late night entertainment zone, and how easy it is, once established, for these premises to obtain longer, early-hours trading permissions.

There seems to be a domino argument that since the pub on the corner is licensed, then the cafe or offices a few yards away should be able to have a licence.

I am acutely aware of this since the recent development of licensed premises along Queen Street, Bank Plain, St. Georges Street and Redwell Street has encroached on the rights of local residents, and these areas have become extensions of Prince of Wales Road with its well-known problems.

Norwich and Norfolk are picking up the cost of this in policing, ambulance and hospital costs, and council street cleaning and enforcement. Prince of Wales Road is an unpleasant introduction to the city even without 'lapdancing'. Lapdancing is the introduction into the sex industry which exploits women and men. Without very strong Council Licensing Policies, I fear that the city will not be able to halt the spread of this distasteful industry.

I would be grateful if Norwich City Council will seriously consider these points, and bring the strongest controls possible into its Licensing and Planning policies.
