The young people from Norwich acted as hosts to the visitors. They developed a closer understanding of the positive and evolving situation in Novi Sad in particular and Serbia in General.

The visitors from Novi Sad experienced a week of continuing wonderment and their visits to London, Southwold and Holkham gave them much to think about.

The value of this exchange exercise is proved in the experience of one of the young visitors who, at the age of 17, has never been further that Belgrade. It was reported that he was quite terrified of going into an aero plane!

To widen the experience of just this one person has proved the exercise worthwhile.

The support of the Twinning Committee contributed greatly to the success of the occasion.






V. Chair Doug Underwood and Soc. Sec Wendy Quinn with eager hands unpacking wool for the weaving workshop.


