




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Planning Application No 16/00223/F & 16/00224/A Site Address 10 Winalls Yard

The site and surroundings

1. 10 Winalls Yard is a three storey building of modern design occupied by the YMCA, Winalls Yard is a cul de sac off All Saints Green towards the junction with Queens Road. The bus station lies directly to the north-west of the property – the free standing ATM subject to this application has been located on the north west facing elevation of the site, it is on the property of 10 Winalls Yard, outside of the ground floor café, facing into the bus station.

2. The site is located within the City Centre Conservation area.

The proposal

4. The application seeks retention of a freestanding ATM adjacent to the YMCA building and café.

Design and conservation

7. This is not an application that I intend to provide conservation and design officer comments on because it does not appear on the basis of the application description to require our specialist conservation and design expertise. This should not be interpreted as a judgement about the acceptability or otherwise of the proposal.

Highways (local)

- 8. I have no objection to the principle of an ATM in this location. The availability of cash is very useful to users of the bus station, so is complimentary. However it is unclear how the ATM is serviced (The Design and Access statement omits this most crucial piece of information). Norfolk CC own the bus station and Konectbus operate it, it is important that the bus station is not affected by bank security vehicles (do they have permission or not?). This needs to be resolved, before we can make a full assessment of the application.
- 9. The question is pretty simply; how will the ATM be serviced (filled with cash or repaired?) given that the bus station is private land (owned by the County Council) and operated on their behalf by Konect bus. The alternative, should permission not

be granted by Norfolk CC, is that the ATM is serviced via a vehicle on Winnals Yard and the operatives walk to the ATM. It's not my call to give authorisation for use of the bus station, so it's really down to the applicant to do their due diligence and give us the information we need to assess the application.

Norfolk police (architectural liaison)

- 10. Whilst the Design and access Statement states "We install and anchor the ATMs in accordance with National Guidelines" the author does not make clear what guidelines they refer to. I recommend that all relevant Security Measures as detailed in the ATM Security working Group 'Best Practice for Physical ATM Security' document are included. A copy of this document is available from the website www.link.co.uk/about-link/site-owners/security-for-atms/
 - Of course once installed the best opportunity to incorporate Crime Reduction Measures will have gone.
- 11. In relation to safety of cash in transit personnel I recommend the following:

 The cash in transit vehicle should be able to park as close to the machine as possible.

On arrival at the site the 'replenisher' or service engineer must be able to rapidly survey the immediate area to check visually that the area is safe.

The ATM should ideally be positioned to allow constant line of sight between the replenisher's vehicle and the ATM.

CCTV should also cover the area where the cash in transit vehicle will park when attending to replenish the machine (several companies replenish ATMs overnight so CCTV and lighting has to be of good quality around the premises)

Without permission to service the cash machine from the Bus Station, cash in transit personnel will be forced to walk from Winnall's Yard or Surrey Street - ideally they should be able to park next to the machine, they will be unable to adequately check that the area is visually safe and line of site between vehicle and ATM will not be possible.

On behalf of Norfolk Constabulary I object to this proposal for the reasons outlined above.

Case Assessment

15. Planning law requires that applications for planning permission must be determined in accordance with the development plan unless material considerations indicate otherwise. Relevant development plan polices are detailed above. Material considerations include policies in the National Planning Framework (NPPF), the Councils standing duties, other policy documents and guidance detailed above and any other matters referred to specifically in the assessment below. The following paragraphs provide an assessment of the main planning issues in this case against relevant policies and material considerations.

Main issue 1: Amenity (Visual)

- 16. Key policies and NPPF paragraphs DM2, DM11, NPPF paragraphs 9 and 17.
- 17. The ATM is positioned in front of the YMCA building and adjacent to the café. Whilst the context is of the bus station, the bus station has been redeveloped to a high standard as has the surrounding developments. The ATM is an incongruous piece of street furniture which would be preferably incorporated within the building or located internally within the café.
- 18. Whilst the development in this area is of modern design, the ATM in this location does nothing to improve this. The soft landscaping in this area has been removed to facilitate installation of the ATM and associated hardstanding. The numerous advertisements add visual clutter to an already busy environment.

Main issue 2: Transport

- Key policies and NPPF paragraphs JCS6, DM28, DM30, DM31, NPPF paragraphs 17 and 39.
- 20. There is no objection to the location of the ATM with regards to facility for users of the machine, although such a facility would perhaps be better located near the bus station itself where there is a higher footfall. There is no vehicular access for use, but this would not be expected in this location.

21. The suitability of the location with regards to servicing cannot be properly assessed on highways grounds, as the agent has been unable to provide any details of this and has asked that the application is assessed on the basis that no permissions/arrangements have been made. Indeed there is no indication that the necessary permissions could be achieved and in this context it is not considered that conditioning these details would necessarily be appropriate particularly in the context of a retrospective application.

Main issue 3: Crime and Security

- 22. Section 17 of the Crime and Disorder Act.
- 23. Insufficient information has been supplied to assess whether safe servicing operation can be undertaken. The council has a duty to prevent, crime and disorder in the exercise of its functions. The police have objected to the application on the basis of servicing arrangements not being possible from the Bus Station and the applicant has not provided any information to demonstrate that this is achievable. On the basis of no servicing arrangements being demonstrated and servicing from Winalls Yard being unacceptable from a crime prevention perspective the proposal is considered to be unacceptable.

Compliance with other relevant development plan policies

Equalities and diversity issues

24. There are no significant equality or diversity issues.

Local finance considerations

- 25. Under Section 70(2) of the Town and Country Planning Act 1990 the council is required when determining planning applications to have regard to any local finance considerations, so far as material to the application. Local finance considerations are defined as a government grant or the Community Infrastructure Levy.
- 26. Whether or not a local finance consideration is material to a particular decision will depend on whether it could help to make the development acceptable in planning terms. It would not be appropriate to make a decision on the potential for the development to raise money for a local authority.
- 27. In this case local finance considerations are not considered to be material to the case.

Conclusion

28. For the reasons outlined above and in the reasons below the recommendation is to refuse the application and take enforcement action to secure the removal of the ATM and reinstatement of the former landscaping. The development is not in accordance with the requirements of the National Planning Policy Framework and the Development Plan, and it has been concluded that the application should be refused, and enforcement action taken to remove the unauthorised ATM.

Recommendation

- (1) refuse application no. 16/00223/F YMCA 10 Winalls Yard Norwich NR1 3GX for the following reasons:
 - (a) The ATM by virtue of its location and freestanding nature would be an incongruous feature which in combination with the advertising on it would detract from the surrounding area and fail to enhance this recently regenerated part of the City Centre and as such would be contrary to policy DM3 of the adopted City of Norwich Replacement Local Plan and contrary to paragraph 64 of the NPPF.
 - (b) The applicant has failed to demonstrate that the ATM can be serviced in a safe manor which would ensure the prevention of crime in accordance with the Council's duties under section 17 of the Crime and Disorder Act 1998 and policy DM3 of the adopted City of Norwich Replacement Local Plan.
- (2) Authorise enforcement action under section 172 of the Town and Country Planning Act 1990 (as amended) to secure the cessation of the unauthorised structure, the replacement of landscaping and the taking of legal proceedings, including prosecution if necessary.

Article 35(2) Statement

The local planning authority in making its decision has had due regard to paragraph 187 of the National Planning Policy Framework as well as the development plan, national planning policy and other material considerations. The local planning authority has sought to negotiate amendments to the scheme in order to overcome the reasons for refusal outlined above, however the applicant has not been able to make the amendments in order to ensure the development complies with national policy and the development plan as such the application has been refused for the reasons outlined above.
