The visitors went to see the development of the 'Riding for the Disabled' programme established by the Milan Petrović School and supported by the Association with a grant to purchase equipment.





The Director, Radmila Rakin-Martinović, and the staff at the school were delighted with Adam who, at the age of thirteen, excelled in the

company of older participants.

Adam himself took full advantage of the opportunity to benefit from the workshops and the company of the professors and their tuition. Looking at the events of the Piano Conference and the programme prepared by Adam there is an astonishing awareness of the high standard and level of musicianship.

The Association is delighted to have been able to help a little with making this happen and to give some support from the Paddy Goldring

Fund.

As you can imagine Adam is a busy young man, particularly moving on to Secondary education. He wrote of his experience which, unfortunately missed the last Newsletter by a day or so but we are very pleased to reproduce his letter now:

Serbia Report by Adam Possener.

Performing at the International Piano Conference in Novi Sad was the chance of a lifetime. Whilst I was there I had the chance to perform in 5 masterclasses from teachers all over the world, to give an hours recital in an amazing performing space, as well as immerse myself in the diverse range of lectures, recitals, and masterclasses.

The Isidor Bajić Music School is home to an impressive array of practice rooms, rehearsal

spaces, and a great concert hall.

Whenever you walked past the music school into the 'Liberty Square' you could always hear a huge variety of music floating out of the windows into the ears of the people in the street.

The quality of the teaching at the conference was second to none, and each teacher brought a degree of specialism and their own perspective on the interpretation and technique of the music I was playing.

The teachers also gave me great advice for not only the music I was playing at the conference, but for my playing in general and my musical development.

At the conference I had the chance to meet some very dedicated and inspirational musicians and I am sure I will keep in contact with them. I found it very interesting to listen to the young musicians from Serbia and all over the world, and to hear how their lifestyle and culture affected their interpretation of the music.

Overall the World Piano Conference was an amazing experience and I would definitely love to go again.

The success of this cooperation with the Isidor Bajić school is a great pleasure to the Committee and members who have continued to work for and encourage the development of music exchanges between Novi Sad and Norwich over many years.

Much work goes into supporting the Milan Petrović school and the Red Cross of Vojvodina in their work with the disadvantaged and handicapped as a priority of the twinning support the Association gives willingly, so it is of pleasing that there is energy and commitment to support an activity that enables young people to interact and visit each other's homeland.

Music and sport are probably the two activities that allows this sharing experience to happen. For various reasons it has not been possible to arrange sporting activities but the Association has earned a reputation for encouraging interaction of youth through music.

It is interesting how these things 'overlap' where music has always been the medium through which the Association supports, financially, projects of the Milan Petrović School.

To this end the Paul Cross Memorial Concert Sub Committee (doesn't that sound GRAND - four people and a pot of coffee!) announce the next fund raising concert will be held at the Assembly House on January 17th 2015. This time the brilliant young pianist, Aleksandar Dermanović from Novi Sad, who is currently studying in London at the Royal College of Music, will perform works which will include Chopin as well as, possibly, a Slavic march by Tchaikovsky and some Serbian composers. He is very much looking forward to playing for the Association.

On October 31st the County Youth Orchestra are giving a concert in Cambridge at the West Road Concert Hall. Irena Josifoska from Novi Sad will be the soloist at the concert when she will perform the Elgar Cello Concerto.

Irena was one of the players from Triorca who played in the Metamorphosen concert at Norwich Cathedral in July. Irena's visit is being organised and funded by Triorca.
