Welcome to the May/June 2015 Newsletter. Visit to Rouen 18th—22nd May 2015 Monday 18th May.

We assembled at Notcutts for our departure to Rouen, 22 members in total, unfortunately the Edwards had to cancel due to illness.

Making good time we stopped at Maidstone services for refreshments. On our way to the Dover Tunnel port the driver was aware of a warning light on his instrument panel, so we made a stop at the services at the Tunnel site for the driver to investigate. It appeared a belt and a pulley had broken. He contacted his depot who advised him a mechanic would be out to us. 2 hours later he appeared and discovered he had parts for a lorry not a coach !

We were assured the parts would be with us asap. 4 hours later the mechanic appeared with the parts and within half an hour we were on our way again. We arrived in Rouen sometime between 10 & 11 pm local time. We were met by our hosts and made our way

to our accommodation by which time we looked a bit like displaced persons.

Tuesday 19th May.

After a well deserved rest and breakfast we boarded the coach for our first days excursion. This would take us into the Haute– Normandie region to the town of Offranville. A small town of farming and light industry, birth place of the portrait artist Jaques-Emile Blanche. We parked outside the Marie and made our way to the eglise St. Ouen. Dating

We visited the interior of St. Ouen with it's houses which added to the charm of Offranstained glass windows, statue of Jeanne ville.

D'Arc and a large painting, a war memorial to the fallen townsfolk many of whom featured in the painting. On leaving St. Ouen we passed the famous 1000 year old yew tree, 23 feet in circumference.




After a short walk we turned into driveway and was greeted by the sight of a Colombier (dovecote) which Offranville is famous for . More like fortified round houses, some 3 storeys high, built of limestone and sandstone with a frieze of decorative masonry which served as a "slippery" barrier to enterprising rats, hoping for a free meal of nesting pigeons, their and the eggs.



By then it had started to rain, undaunted we carried on to see more of what Offranville had to offer. Those less intrepid escaped to a café for refreshment and to dry out! We all met up at the Parc du Colombier for lunch. A Buffet Campagnard was laid on for us.





Continuing on we saw many half timbered

Washed down with Vin, Cidre, D'eau and beer!

Followed by a typical apple tart, this completed a very filling lunch.

We boarded the coach once more to make our way a short distance to the Manoir d'Angio at Varangeville. The Manoir was built in the 16th century inspired by the Italian buildings of the Renaissance.

Within the courtyard we encountered another




Colombier, built in the 17th century and was the largest in France at that time. Measuring 11 metres high and 22 metres in circumference, crowned by a "bulb" shaped dome.

It could hold up to 3200 pigeons, the pigeons



meat and eggs were for the aristocrats table, the resulting litter on the floor was used as fertiliser. The peasants suffered because of the pigeons feeding off their crops ! (no wonder they revolted. Ed) After a good visit taking in the interior of the Colombier and the rooms and Loggia we made our way back to the coach.



On our journey back to Rouen we took the scenic route travelling up to the coast and making a stop.

Those who wanted to took in the view of the Atlantic Ocean and being quite windy made a good spectacle.

We then took tea or what ever was on offer in a nearby Café.

Once more onto the coach for our return journey to Rouen, arriving at rush hour, our driver Tony was more than a match for the French drivers! Wednesday 20th May.

Today was a free day for us to take things at a leisurely pace. The planned walking tour of hidden Rouen was cancelled. We all gathered at the Hotel de Ville for the official reception, where there was more meet and greet, with Champagne, soft drinks and Canapes.

Thursday 21st May.

We boarded the coach once more for a visit to the Chateau du Champ de Bataille in the Department of the Eure. The Chateau was built in the 17th century. But it's story begins in year 935ad, a huge battle took place on the grounds of the Chateau, between two noble families, the Epee's and the de Danois. The former being the victors and thanks to that victory Normandy gained its independence.



Like many Chateaus, Champ de Bataille fell victim to the Revolution and up to the 19th and 20th centuries the Chateau fell into disrepair.
