Subject	Award of contract for on street CCTV maintenance, repair and upgrade service	

KEY DECISION

Purpose

To advise of the procurement process for the on-street CCTV maintenance, repair and upgrade service contract and seek approval to award the contract.

Recommendation

To approve the award of the on-street CCTV maintenance, repair and upgrade service contract to Quadrant Security Group Ltd for up to 5 years from 1 April 2014 at a cost of £156,122.

Corporate and service priorities

The report helps to meet the corporate priorities of *Making Norwich a safe and clean city* and *Value for money services*.

Financial implications

The contract has an overall value of at least £156,122 over the 5 year period. An element of scalability has been included in the specification so that the service can be varied in response to changing requirements without penalty to the authority. The value of the contract is likely to increase the 5 year term above the key decision threshold depending on the amount of upgrade work required.

Report

- 1. Norwich City Council is currently responsible for organising the maintenance, repair and upgrade of the public space CCTV system located within Norwich.
- 2. The system comprises of approximately 90 cameras, a control room, air conditioned auxiliary room housing main CCTV matrix and associated ICT management systems and linked fibre cabling, broadband and wireless networks.
- 3. The following outline requirements for the service were identified:
 - a) 5 year term contract with the option of terminating early if requirements change.
 - b) Scalability of requirement to enable the size of the CCTV estate to be varied without penalty.
 - c) To cover repairs and maintenance (as per existing contract) but also include the scope for upgrade work if required. It is not proposed to tie the authority in to purchasing upgrade work from the selected supplier, but by including it within the scope of the contract it will give the authority the option of proceeding with the selected supplier, without further competition, subject to a value for money quote being obtained.
- 4. The opportunity was advertised on Business Link Contracts Finder on 16 August 2013 as a two stage restricted tender process. The first stage involves interested suppliers submitting pre-qualification questionnaires (PQQs). The PQQs provide information on the applicant's company history and experience, financial standing, technical capacity to carry out the service, and corporate social responsibility profile. The PQQs are evaluated with the highest six scoring suppliers being invited through to the tender stage of the process.
- 5. A total of 13 suppliers submitted PQQs. The six suppliers scored between 81 and 95 marks out of 100 and were invited to tender for the opportunity. The unsuccessful suppliers scored between 32 and 60 marks.
- 6. Invitations to tender were published on 28 October 2013 these were completed and returned by all six suppliers by the deadline on 29 November 2013.
- 7. The tenders were evaluated by a panel from the relevant service areas.
- 8. Details of the winning tender are as follows:

9. The five other tenders were priced between £156,122 and £456,998 and scored between 27 to 40 marks for quality and 0 to 59 marks for price.

10. The annual cost breakdown of the winning tender is as follows:

- 11. A condition of the contract is that the selected supplier pays its staff delivering the contract at least the national minimum living wage (currently £7.65 per hour).
- 12. A Social Value Act 2012 assessment of this opportunity can be found in Appendix 1 of this report.
- 13. Quadrant Security Group Ltd have already been providing the service for the authority for a number of years and their performance overall has been good. The current cost of the contract is approximately £29,556, but this does not include the electrical testing programme that has been added to the new requirement.
