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Report

Partnerships register

- 1. The corporate governance framework and toolkit for working in partnerships was developed and implemented in 2009. It supports a sound system of internal control in relation to partnership arrangements.
- 2. The framework was approved by executive in October 2008 and the initial assessment was approved by executive in April 2009. This is the fourth annual review of the partnerships register.
- 3. A similar process to previous years was followed for this year's annual review. The partnerships have been assessed and a new partnership scorecard was completed for every partnership. Any new arrangements have been added.
- 4. The updated partnership register is included at annex A and now also includes information on where there are direct financial contributions to partnerships.
- 5. There are now 34 partnership arrangements on the register. This compares with 40 partnerships on the register last year which reflects the continually changing landscape of partnership activity.
- 6. The following partnerships have been removed from the register:

Central Locality Mental Health Forum - This partnership ended 1 April 2013. Changes to the NHS taking effect from 1 April 2013 mean that it is now the responsibility of Clinical Commissioning Groups to engage with local stakeholders.

Citywide Board.- This partnership ended in February 2013 as the result of a new tenant involvement structure being introduced. Three of its achievements were to increase tenant involvement, to scrutinise performance and inform target setting within the housing service.

Greater Norwich Housing Partnership (GNHP) - No further meetings of the GNHP were held after April 2012 as district council partnership picked up on matters covered by it on a task and finish basis. One of its achievements was to develop a cross district protocol for homelessness.

Norfolk Housing Strategic Board - This partnership ended in February 2013 as the function is picked up through task and finish lead projects e.g. homeless protocol.

Norfolk Offenders Accommodation Board (NOAF) - The last NOAF meeting was held in May 2012. The police and crime commissioner office has implemented changes to the way rehabilitation of offenders will be managed. Strategic housing authorities will be represented on the new steering group by Broadland District Council. One of NOAF's many achievements was to deliver, implement and review the Norfolk Housing and Support Strategy and Action Plan for Offenders and it demonstrated good practice in numerous areas.

Norwich Day Care Opportunities Board - This partnership ended in 2012 as a new structure has been introduced. Among its achievements it identified sheltered housing schemes to deliver day opportunities and enhanced social inclusion for the members who had previously attended Essex and Silver Rooms and for the sheltered housing tenants.

Norwich Integrated Care Opportunities Project - The partnership ended in 2013 as its objectives had been met. It had achieved better understanding of the role housing and in particular sheltered housing within the context of health and social care, and better joined up working with district nurses, social workers and sheltered housing staff, thus hopefully giving better outcomes for older people.

7. The following partnerships have been added to the register:

Norwich Pledge for Health - Initially launched in early 2013 as part of Healthy Norwich, the Norwich Pledge for Health was accepted as meeting the criteria for a partnership with the Department of Health Responsibility Deal in September 2013. As a partner the council is required to submit annual returns detailing uptake of the Norwich - Pledge for Health. The council's lead officer is Jaan Stanton, environmental health manager. The significance score is minor.

8. There have been the following other changes to partnerships on the register:

Greater Norwich Growth Board (formerly Greater Norwich development partnership) – In reviewing how to move from a planning policy to a much broader economic delivery focus, it has been recognised that this will require a new approach and it has been agreed to replace it with a board that is tasked with co-ordinating the delivery of the growth ambitions for the area through monitoring an annual business plan which will have been agreed by the constituent authorities.

- 9. Through implementing the corporate governance framework the council has identified just one highly significant partnership, the Norwich and HCA strategic partnership. This is the same as last year.
- 10. Further analysis on less significant partnerships has been undertaken with one change worthy of note, Norwich Fringe countryside management project has moved from moderate to major significance.

Business relationship register

- 11. The corporate business relationship and contract management framework and toolkit were developed during 2012. They support effective management of business relationships and contracts.
- 12. The management and monitoring toolkit has been rolled out fully across the council's larger contracts (assessed as platinum and gold contracts). This shows:
 - a) 11 'platinum' = high spend (over £500k) and high criticality business relationships and contracts

- b) 23 'gold' = low spend (under £500k) and high criticality business relationships and contracts.
- 13. The business relationship and contract register is included at annex B showing the platinum and gold arrangements.
- 14. There are also over 80 silver and bronze contracts which are low spend and low criticality contracts and relationships.

Voluntary and community sector grants

- 15. A total of £143,335 has been made available to voluntary and community sector organisations seeking grants for projects or ongoing costs in 2014-15, with a further £173,500 committed to organisations delivering projects for a second or third year.
- 16. Grants were awarded for all corporate priorities excepting 'decent housing for all', which has contracts with providers. The additional 'reducing inequalities' priority is a cross cutting theme.
- 17. The following three organisations will be funded by the council for the first time:

Chalk Circle Theatre

BME consortium

Norwich Food bank.

- 18. At annex C is a breakdown of grants and contracts awarded to voluntary and community sector organisations. Those that are specific awards for 2014-15 rather than ongoing arrangements are highlighted.
- 19. Small grants and capital grants have not been included in this breakdown. We anticipate approximately £21,760 will be available for capital grants expenditure for 2014-15. Small and capital grants are decided during the time period; small grants are all for £500 or less and listed on the website when awarded.






