## **KEY DECISION**

## Purpose

To consider the award of the contract for the provision of gardening services for vulnerable Norwich City Council social housing tenants.

### Recommendation

To award the contract for the provision of gardening services for vulnerable Norwich City Council social housing tenants to Mow & Grow Ltd for a period of up to 5 years from 1 September 2014.

### **Corporate and service priorities**

The report helps to meet the corporate priority "Decent housing for all" and the service plan priority of maintaining all homes to a good standard.

### **Financial implications**

The financial consequences of this report are awarding a contract the value of which is estimated to be £47,800. The cost of the service partly funded through charges made to tenants. The rest of the cost is funded via other budget provision

## Report

## Background

- 1. Since 2009 the council have provided a gardening service that offers assistance to tenants who are unable to maintain their gardens due to physical or mental health issues, a disability or long term ill-health.
- 2. Residents are charged for the service at the rate of £20 per garden clearance and a further £4.30 per week if they choose to join the garden maintenance programme.
- 3. The selected supplier will be expected to manage the gardens of 220 tenants on a maintenance scheme of approximately 6 visits per year (pro rata) in addition to the clearance where required.
- 4. The current contract with Mow & Grow Ltd expires on 31 August 2014 and award of a contract to continue the service is required.

## **Tender process**

- 5. The council have a requirement for a supplier with a community-based or social enterprise focus who have experience of working with local volunteers or community representatives to provide a gardening service. This is an element of the current service provision and has proved successful in adding social value to the initiative.
- 6. Due to the value of the contract the Council were required to conduct an assessment in accordance with the Social Value Act 2012. The results of this can be found in Appendix A.
- 7. An open competitive tendering process has been used to identify a suitable supplier.
- 8. A contract notice was placed on the council's e-tendering portal and on "Contract Finder" inviting tenders.
- 9. Suppliers were asked to provide a number of method statements proposing how they were going to deliver the service
- 10. A total of 14 suppliers expressed an interest in the project and two submitted tenders by the closing date on 23 May 2014.

### **Tender evaluation**

- 11. The tenders were evaluated by a panel comprising of the Housing operations manager, the Neighbourhood team leader and the Contract and procurement manager. The evaluation criteria stated in the tender documents were weighted as 30% price and 70% quality – with the intention of awarding the contract to the highest scoring tender.
- 12. The tender from Mow & Grow Ltd scored a total of 68.33 (out of 70) marks for quality and 20.69 (out of 30) marks for price. This gave a total of 89.02 (out of 100) marks.

- 13. The tender from the second supplier scored a total of 48.33 (out of 70) marks for quality and 30.00 (out of 30) marks for price. This gave a total of 78.33 (out of 100) marks.
- 14. Although the tender from the second supplier was lower in cost it was also evaluated as being lower in quality in relation to engagement with community representatives and volunteers, understanding of tenants' needs, equality & diversity considerations and quality assurance.
- 15. In their tender, Mow & Grow Ltd (a social enterprise), gave assurances of continuing their engagement with community groups and volunteers in delivering the requirement.

## Finance

16. The cost of the service is covered by charges made to the tenants receiving the service.
