

The quarry we visited was an underground excavation in the area of Le Maladrerie. Some of the supporting pillars of limestone are crumbling and have been replaced by reenforced concrete pillars. There was evidence of fossils in the stone and stalactites hanging down from the ceiling. Evidence of ancient and modern stone cutting was seen. This was one of many quarries in and around Caen it has both underground and open cast quarries. A commercial site has now been built over the top of the quarry, excavations ceased in 1986 but limestone is still extracted for restoration works.

The group then went on to Caen Castle (also of Caen stone) where a short break to explore the castle, unfortunately it was not possible to visit the art exhibition or any of the interiors of other buildings. We then took lunch at the on site restaurant, a leisurely affair with lots of good food and conversation

In the afternoon we made our way to the Abbaye-aux-Hommes, where we had an intensive tour presentation visiting many rooms and admiring the artwork and furnishings before finding ourselves at the tomb of Guilluame, the grave had been desecrated many times in the past and only one relic remains of William of Normandy.

On Saturday 13th May we travelled to Honfleur. Our journey to Honfleur was through rain which did not bode well for our visit, but the clouds and rain disappeared an we had a relatively fine day for the visit. Our first siting of Honfleur was from the "Pont de Normande" On arrival we took a walk during the free time we had around the Vieux Bassin, exploring the narrow streets and seeing the many timber framed houses. There was a market, being Saturday and it was pleasant amongst the stalls selling all wandering kinds of produce. Then a very enjoyable lunch with a great choice of seafood on the quayside. In the afternoon we took a boat for a mini cruise taking in the amazing Normandy bridge. The "Pont de Normande" was built between 1988 and 1995, it's overall length is 2113.5 metres the central span over the Seine 856 metres and the height of the two central pylons 214 metres and 71 metres above the water in the central span. We ravelled under the bridge towards the port of Le Havre and had very good views of the bridge from every angle.. It was a bit breezy on the boat but calm conditions made all the more enjoyable

Starting on the 29th July is the display of the

captured Tricolour, at Norwich Castle Museum. The following information from Rory Quinn.

The flag is from Le Genereux which escaped the defeat at the battle of the Nile where Nelson was victorious against the French. It captured the British ship, HMS Leander, and its captain, Berry. Berry was exchanged for French officers and in a subsequent battle captured Le Genereux and sent the flag to Nelson who gave it to the city. It was last on display in 1905, the centenary of Trafalgar.

It is the size of a tennis court and is the oldest tricolour in the UK. As yet the museum has not been able to obtain information about surviving tricolours in France. It could be the oldest as flags tend to be used until they wear out. This survives because it was captured. It is also from the First Republic, that is before Napoleon declared himself emperor.
