


The Milan Petrović School.

It was with great satisfaction that the visit included an opportunity to attended an event to honour Muriel. As many readers will know Muriel was a dedicated and supportive Honorary Vice President of the Association with long and close contacts with Novi Sad.

Muriel wanted her books and papers to go to the University of Novi Sad which she had 'helped to set up' when she was English Lektor there.

Through the kind offices of the Serbian Embassy in London her papers and books were delivered to the Faculty of Philosophy at the University. It was here that a small ceremony took place. A space has been set aside to house her legacy of manuscripts, publications and an extensive card index filling system which is on display in dedicated cabinets. All disciplines of the University are able to use the facility as Muriel's talents and scholarship encompassed mediaeval orthodox church manuscripts, many translations from Serbian into English of historical and modern books and papers, as well as significant works in Russian.

Amongst all the celebrations and activities during the time in Novi Sad important connections between people were established and developed. The number of Serbians who contact the visitors whilst they are there and speak about the time they visited Norwich on exchanges when they were younger increases. Friendships are established and it is sometimes difficult to respond to the question "Do you know —— I stayed with them when I was in Norwich?" Contact has been lost and it is often wondered "how they are?" Kristof, who speaks impeccable English and visited Norwich in 1988 has asked after his former hosts. During a conversation at the Philosophy Faculty the English Professor (who also, we think, visited in 1988) spoke of the family Rowe with whom she stayed and remained in contact with for some time

Serbian Wines at Lowestoft.

Members of the Association had been invited to a tasting of Serbian wines at the Ferini Gallery in Lowestoft. Six members enjoyed a convivial evening with the Le Plaisir Wine Society. David Ferris has worked hard over several years to bring this about. Mr Saša Uzelac, the First Counsellor for Economic Affairs at the Serbian Embassy was pleased to attend. The wines were very generously supplied by the Embassy. Sonia Boggis of Blyth Valley Wines gave an erudite and very well researched presentation and members of the wine society who are very discerning pronounced the wines to be excellent.

Triorca

The activities of this International Youth Orchestra have been covered in previous editions of the Newsletter. The first three year period of funding for the orchestra has come to an end and efforts are being made to secure the financial future of the organisation for the next three years. During the recent visit to Novi Sad discussions took place regarding the artistic plans involving the three centres of Novi Sad, Norwich and Koblenz. We will report news of their activities and of the support provided by the Norfolk Youth Orchestra which provides takented performers for Triorca.

The British-Serbian Benevolent Trust

This charity has been in existence for many years and provides support for Serbian children in need in their own country. It is pleasing to report that the charity has been able to give financial support to the Isidor Bajić Music School in Novi Sad for the purchase of instruments. This has extended their ability to support their talented pupils in Triorca.

The English Hospital at Sremska Kamenica

This hospital was built by Dr Katherine MacPhail soon after the First World War. Muriel Heppell was much concerned with the fate of the building and, together with Dr Želimir Mikić (who wrote the definitive biography of Katherine MacPhail, "Ever Yours Sincerely") decided that the proceeds of the sale of the English version, translated by Muriel, should form the basis of a fund to be used as a contribution to the refurbishment of the Hospital. During the meeting with President Siniša Sević he was able to give assurances regarding the future of the Hospital.
