## COUNTER NOTICE TO TEMPORARY EVENT NOTICE – SECTION 105 LICENSING ACT 2003


### Counter Notice (Temporary Event Notice) – Permitted Temporary Activities

On **1<sup>st</sup> September 2021** the licensing authority received from you, **Mr Dean Bath**, two temporary event notices (“the notices”) in respect of proposed temporary licensable activities due to take place on **18<sup>th</sup> and 21<sup>st</sup> September** at Car Park, Lower Clarence Road, Norwich, namely to use the premises for the sale by retail of alcohol between **12:30 to 15:00 on the 18<sup>th</sup> Sept** and **17:15 to 19:45 on the 21<sup>st</sup> September** (this was amended during committee). The licensing authority received an objection under section 104(2) of the Licensing Act 2003 from the Norfolk Constabulary to the notices on the basis that the licensing objectives, specifically the prevention of crime and disorder would be seriously undermined if the proposed temporary licensable activity took place and a hearing was held on the 16<sup>th</sup> September 2021. At this hearing it was determined to serve a counter notice to both applications as the proposed events would undermine the prevention of crime and disorder licensing objective for the reasons given in the attached notice.

The Licensing Act 2003 makes provision for you to appeal against this counter notice and reference should be made to Schedule 5 of the Licensing Act 2003. Any appeal must be made to a magistrates’ court and commenced by notice of appeal given to the designated officer at the magistrates’ court within the period of 21 days beginning with the day on which you were notified of the decision appealed against, except that no appeal may be brought later than five working days before the day on which the event period specified in the temporary event notice begins.

This counter notice is accompanied by a notice giving reasons for the decision.

Under section 136 of the Licensing Act 2003, a person commits an offence if he carries on a licensable activity on or from any premises otherwise than under and in accordance with an authorisation; or if he knowingly allows a licensable activity to be so carried on.
