Report

1. Cabinet agreed a reducing inequalities action plan in March 2015. This established some principles in terms of areas of focus both in terms of workstreams and geography together with some key actions. As a key priority for the council activity since March has focussed on drawing together an updated action plan for the rest of 2015-16
2. The underlying principle has been that wherever possible this should build upon existing work and service plans and tweak or draw into sharper focus particular activity that:
 - a) Coordinates and maximises advice and support for residents hardest hit by welfare changes.
 - b) Maximises opportunities for residents to access apprenticeships and jobs.
 - c) Ensures the council's services, procurement and assets have maximum impact in reducing inequality.
 - d) Trials locality-based solutions to improving wellbeing amongst disadvantaged groups.
3. A geographic focus is also desirable to help concentrate activity.
4. A draft updated *Reducing inequalities action plan programme* for 2015-16 is attached at appendix 1.
5. Whilst this is a long plan, it also means that if a small number of activities slip or need to be dropped, the overall delivery will not necessarily suffer. For example, three of only eight actions slipping.
6. The plan also includes a suggested geographic focus concentrated on Lakenham. Discussions with the Norwich Clinical Commissioning Group show a keenness to collaborate and develop some joint initiatives in this area. Whilst four wards were identified in the original cabinet report, Lakenham experiences some significant issues of inequality as well as appearing to offer a number of live opportunities. Some of these opportunities include:
 - a) A link to one end of a planned pedalway to promote physical activity and greener travel.
 - b) The possibility of jobs and skills afforded by major new developments alongside new community and employment infrastructure.
 - c) Identified physical and social assets to test options on local food initiatives
 - d) The possibility of small-scale estate redesign to tackle some clusters of anti-social behaviour.
 - e) Willingness of local GP surgeries to run community events and reach beyond traditional patient-based activity toward wider preventative considerations.

- f) A high level of council housing stock, which may afford opportunities to utilise existing teams and resources to support and target activity.
 - g) The chance to encourage local schools to work with communities and support local initiatives. This is as yet untested.
 - h) An chance to test the willingness of residents to be more active in developing community responses to local issues.
7. A draft programme of activities that aim to reduce health inequalities in Lakenham are included at appendix 2.
8. Ongoing changes and prioritisation will be undertaken by the executive head of strategy, people and neighbourhoods in consultation with the portfolio holder for fairness and equality.

GP referrals to debt advice	Set up local referral routes to debt advice and wider support from GPs, potentially with appointments offered within the surgery. This could be delivered via the existing advice contract or an extension of this and could be broadened to include benefits checks as part of a wider financial 'health check'. The service could also be offered from other local partners. Jobs support	Deliver a local awareness raising campaign (via local networks) about available new employment opportunities and offer associated local 'jobs clubs' where residents can access the internet and get advice on CVs/applying. Get Active sessions	Deliver a programme of 'Get Active' sessions, aimed at getting families or other targeted audiences to be more active.
