Purpose

Members are asked, in accordance with the delegation of licensing functions contained in the Norwich City Council Statement of Licensing Policy (Licensing Act 2003), to consider the application for the grant of a premises licence in respect of 61 Newmarket Road Norwich NR2 2HW following the receipt of relevant representation.

Recommendation:

It is recommended that members determine the application to grant the premises Licence in accordance with the:

- Licensing Act 2003 and subsequent regulations
- Guidance issued under Section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003; and
- Norwich City Council Statement of Licensing Policy

Policy Framework

The council has five corporate priorities, which are:

- People live independently and well in a diverse and safe city.
- Norwich is a sustainable and healthy city.
- Norwich has the infrastructure and housing it needs to be a successful city.
- The city has an inclusive economy in which residents have equal opportunity to flourish.
- Norwich City Council is in good shape to serve the city.

Report Details

The application

- 1. The applicant is Eponymous Holdings Ltd t/a Old Spirits Company.
- 2. The proposed DPS is Edgar Harden.
- 3. The application seeks to allow the licensable activities, times and opening hours as set out in the application form, which is attached at appendix A. This also includes the steps proposed to promote the licensing objectives (operating schedule).

- 7. The sub-committee is asked to note that it may not modify the conditions or reject the whole or part of the application merely because it considers it desirable to do so. It must actually be appropriate in order to promote the licensing objectives.
- 8. The representation received appears to relate to issues that fall under the licensing objectives.

a) General – all four licensing objectives (b,c,d,e)

List here steps you will take to promote all four licensing objectives together.

As the business is run from the one room basement of a terraced house on the Newmarket Road and has only one employee and no visitors it is a small and quiet enterprise. The business runs online exclusively and orders are shipped out three times weekly (MWF; shipper stops in front of house for 5 mins each time). The sole employee lives in the house, does not come and go much and nobody visits the business. This is a not a public-facing business with direct contact to the public. Premises are not open to the public. No customers come to the premises to taste or select beverages. Online sales only.

b) The prevention of crime and disorder

In addition to the small footprint and quiet nature of the business, as described above, the public is unaware of it's physical presence or location and as such a break-in is unlikely. As premises are not open to the public and no customers come to the premises to taste or select beverages public intoxication is not an issue. Online sales only.

c) Public safety

The public is unaware of the physical presence or location of the business, nobody visits the office and no alcohol is made available to the public or consumed on site.

d) The prevention of public nuisance

As the business is run from the one room basement of a terraced house on the Newmarket Road and has only one employee and no visitors it is a small and quiet enterprise. The business runs online exclusively and orders are shipped out three times weekly (MWF; shipper stops in front of house for 5 mins each time). The sole employee lives in the house, does not come and go much and nobody visits the business. This is a not a public-facing business with direct contact to the public. No customers come to the premises to taste or select beverages. Online sales only.

e) The protection of children from harm

Visitors to the website must click on an "I am of legal drinking age in my area" button to go beyond he home page, on which no images of alcohol are displayed. The type of material being sold is quite expensive and rare and would take at least 24 hours to arrive at the purchaser's address under the most expedient conditions. Thus it is not the type of cheap quick fix alcohol being sought by underage drinkers.

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NOTES ON DEMONSTRATING ENTITLEMENT TO WORK IN THE UK

Entitlement to work/immigration status for individual applicants and applications from partnerships which are not limited liability partnerships:

A licence may not be held by an individual or an individual in a partnership who is resident in the UK who:

- does not have the right to live and work in the UK; or
- is subject to a condition preventing him or her from doing work relating to the carrying on of a licensable activity.

Any premises licence issued in respect of an application made on or after 6 April 2017 will become invalid if the holder ceases to be entitled to work in the UK.

Applicants must demonstrate that they have an entitlement to work in the UK and are not subject to a condition preventing them from doing work relating to the carrying on of a licensable activity. They do this in one of two ways: 1) by providing with this application copies or scanned copies of the documents listed below (which do not need to be certified), or 2) by providing their 'share code' to enable the licensing authority to carry out a check using the Home Office online right to work checking service (see below).

Documents which demonstrate entitlement to work in the UK

- An expired or current passport showing the holder, or a person named in the passport as the child of the holder, is A British citizen or a citizen of the UK and Colonies having the right of abode in the UK [please see note below about which sections of the passport to copy].
- An expired or current passport or national identity card showing the holder, or a person named in the passport
 as the child of the holder, is a national of a European Economic Area country or Switzerland.
- A Registration Certificate or document certifying permanent residence issued by the Home Office to a national
 of a European Economic Area country or Switzerland.
- A Permanent Residence Card issued by the Home Office to the family member of a national of a European Economic Area country or Switzerland.
- A current Biometric Immigration Document (Biometric Residence Permit) issued by the Home Office to the holder indicating that the person named is allowed to stay indefinitely in the UK, or has no time limit on their stay in the UK.
- A current passport endorsed to show that the holder is exempt from immigration control, is allowed to stay
 indefinitely in the UK, has the right of abode in the UK, or has no time limit on their stay in the UK.
- A current Immigration Status Document issued by the Home Office to the holder with an endorsement
 indicating that the named person is allowed to stay indefinitely in the UK or has no time limit on their stay in
 the UK, when produced in combination with an official document giving the person's permanent National
 Insurance number and their name issued by a Government agency or a previous employer.
- A birth or adoption certificate issued in the UK, when produced in combination with an official document giving the person's permanent National Insurance number and their name issued by a Government agency or a previous employer.
- A birth or adoption certificate issued in the Channel Islands, the Isle of Man or Ireland when produced in combination with an official document giving the person's permanent National Insurance number and their name issued by a Government agency or a previous employer.
- A certificate of registration or naturalisation as a British citizen, when produced in combination with an
 official document giving the person's permanent National Insurance number and their name issued by a
 Government agency or a previous employer.

- A current passport endorsed to show that the holder is allowed to stay in the UK and is currently allowed to
 work and is not subject to a condition preventing the holder from doing work relating to the carrying on of a
 licensable activity.
- A current Biometric Immigration Document (Biometric Residence Permit) issued by the Home Office to the holder which indicates that the named person can currently stay in the UK and is allowed to work relation to the carrying on of a licensable activity.
- A current Residence Card issued by the Home Office to a person who is not a national of a European Economic
 Area state or Switzerland but who is a family member of such a national or who has derivative rights or
 residence.
- A current Immigration Status Document containing a photograph issued by the Home Office to the holder
 with an endorsement indicating that the named person may stay in the UK, and is allowed to work and is not
 subject to a condition preventing the holder from doing work relating to the carrying on of a licensable activity
 when produced in combination with an official document giving the person's permanent National Insurance
 number and their name issued by a Government agency or a previous employer.
- A Certificate of Application, less than 6 months old, issued by the Home Office under regulation 18(3) or 20(2) of the Immigration (European Economic Area) Regulations 2016, to a person who is not a national of a European Economic Area state or Switzerland but who is a family member of such a national or who has derivative rights of residence.
- Reasonable evidence that the person has an outstanding application to vary their permission to be in the UK
 with the Home Office such as the Home Office acknowledgement letter or proof of postage evidence, or
 reasonable evidence that the person has an appeal or administrative review pending on an immigration
 decision, such as an appeal or administrative review reference number.
- Reasonable evidence that a person who is not a national of a European Economic Area state or Switzerland but
 who is a family member of such a national or who has derivative rights of residence in exercising treaty rights in
 the UK including:-
 - evidence of the applicant's own identity such as a passport.
 - evidence of their relationship with the European Economic Area family member e.g. a marriage certificate, civil partnership certificate or birth certificate, and
 - evidence that the European Economic Area national has a right of permanent residence in the UK or is one
 of the following if they have been in the UK for more than 3 months:
 - (i) working e.g. employment contract, wage slips, letter from the employer.
 - (ii) self-employed e.g. contracts, invoices, or audited accounts with a bank,
 - (iii) studying e.g. letter from the school, college or university and evidence of sufficient funds; or
 - (iv) self-sufficient e.g. bank statements.

Family members of European Economic Area nationals who are studying or financially independent must also provide evidence that the European Economic Area national and any family members hold comprehensive sickness insurance in the UK. This can include a private medical insurance policy, an EHIC card or an S1, S2 or S3 form.

Original documents must not be sent to licensing authorities. If the document copied is a passport, a copy of the following pages should be provided:-

- (i) any page containing the holder's personal details including nationality;
- (ii) any page containing the holder's photograph;
- (iii) any page containing the holder's signature;
- (iv) any page containing the date of expiry; and
- (v) any page containing information indicating the holder has permission to enter or remain in the UK and is permitted to work.

If the document is not a passport, a copy of the whole document should be provided.

Your right to work will be checked as part of your licensing application and this could involve us checking your immigration status with the Home Office. We may otherwise share information with the Home Office. Your licence application will not be determined until you have complied with this guidance.

Home Office online right to work checking service

As an alternative to providing a copy of the documents listed above, applicants may demonstrate their right to work by allowing the licensing authority to carry out a check with the Home Office online right to work checking service.

To demonstrate their right to work via the Home Office online right to work checking service, applicants should include in this application their 9-digit share code (provided to them upon accessing the service at https://www.gov.uk/prove-right-to-work) which, along with the applicant's date of birth (provided within this application), will allow the licensing authority to carry out the check.

In order to establish the applicant's right to work, the check will need to indicate that the applicant is allowed to work in the United Kingdom and is not subject to a condition preventing them from doing work relating to the carrying on of a licensable activity.

An online check will not be possible in all circumstances because not all applicants will have an immigration status that can be checked online. - Indoor sporting events: no licence is required for performances between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, provided that the audience does not exceed 1000.
- Boxing or Wrestling Entertainment: no licence is required for a contest, exhibition or display of Greco-Roman
 wrestling, or freestyle wrestling between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, provided that the audience does not
 exceed 1000. Combined fighting sports defined as a contest, exhibition or display which combines boxing or
 wrestling with one or more martial arts are licensable as a boxing or wrestling entertainment rather than an
 indoor sporting event.
- Live music: no licence permission is required for:
 - o a performance of unamplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, on any premises.
 - o a performance of amplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day on premises authorised to sell alcohol for consumption on those premises, provided that the audience does not exceed 500.
 - o a performance of amplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, in a workplace that is not licensed to sell alcohol on those premises, provided that the audience does not exceed 500.
 - a performance of amplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, in a church hall, village hall, community hall, or other similar community premises, that is not licensed by a premises licence to sell alcohol, provided that (a) the audience does not exceed 500, and (b) the organiser gets consent for the performance from a person who is responsible for the premises.
 - a performance of amplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, at the non-residential premises of (i) a local authority, or (ii) a school, or (iii) a hospital, provided that (a) the audience does not exceed 500, and (b) the organiser gets consent for the performance on the relevant premises from: (i) the local authority concerned, or (ii) the school or (iii) the health care provider for the hospital.
- Recorded Music: no licence permission is required for:
 - o any playing of recorded music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day on premises authorised to sell alcohol for consumption on those premises, provided that the audience does not exceed 500.
 - o any playing of recorded music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, in a church hall, village hall, community hall, or other similar community premises, that is not licensed by a premises licence to sell alcohol, provided that (a) the audience does not exceed 500, and (b) the organiser gets consent for the performance from a person who is responsible for the premises.
 - any playing of recorded music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, at the non-residential premises of (i) a local authority, or (ii) a school, or (iii) a hospital, provided that (a) the audience does not exceed 500, and (b) the organiser gets consent for the performance on the relevant premises from: (i) the local authority concerned, or (ii) the school proprietor or (iii) the health care provider for the hospital.

- Dance: no licence is required for performances between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, provided that the audience does not exceed 500. However, a performance which amounts to adult entertainment remains licensable.
- Cross activity exemptions: no licence is required between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, with no limit on audience size for:
 - any entertainment taking place on the premises of the local authority where the entertainment is provided by or on behalf of the local authority:
 - any entertainment taking place on the hospital premises of the health care provider where the O entertainment is provided by or on behalf of the health care provider;
 - any entertainment taking place on the premises of the school where the entertainment is provided by or O on behalf of the school proprietor; and
 - any entertainment (excluding films and a boxing or wrestling entertainment) taking place at a travelling n circus, provided that (a) it takes place within a moveable structure that accommodates the audience, and (b) that the travelling circus has not been located on the same site for more than 28 consecutive days.



We are writing our objection to the granting of the above license.

The applicant has lived at No. 61 for 7 years, why is he only now applying for a License to sell wines and spirits?

We were under the impression he was working from his rear garage. We now understand that that his stock of spirits/wine is stored in the basement of his house. As this terrace of houses is Grade 2 listed we are concerned that the stored spirits would act as an accelerant, in case of fire.

In his statement he quotes: "orders are shipped out 3 times weekly". We have to contradict this, as the application failed to mention how many van movements deliver stock to No. 61. We see regular van courier movements on most weekdays, in the last couple of years we have seen days when three vans come on one day. We have noticed a great deal of difference since the vans are not coming to his house.

We are often asked to take in large heavy parcels - which we decline. This has happened 3 times in the last 3 weeks, the last one being on September 2nd.

We are worried and concerned that if the license is granted this will be detrimental to the sale of our property, as a property search will flag up a licensed business selling alcohol.

I am writing to make a comment on the above Application.

My interest is as a near neighbour of the Applicant. To put the area in context; numbers 47-69 Newmarket Road are a row of terraced houses, Grade 2 listed in a conservation area. They are approached by a private drive which the owners are responsible to maintain, there are two exits on to Newmarket Road.

The Applicant appears to rely on courier services to deliver stock and collect his sales to his front door. This has been an issue for members of the terrace for some time as the frequency of these deliveries has been multiple times a day much more than you would expect for normal domestic deliveries. It seems that the applicant proposes to limit the collection of his sales to 3x a week. If he could coordinate his delivery of stock to take place at the same time then this may go some way to alleviate this particular problem. Alternatively the Applicant could have his deliveries taken to a storage location away from the Terrace to be collected by the Applicant in larger batches.

The question of the inconvenience to near neighbours also raises the issue Planning and change of use from Residential to Commercial. I would suggest that the Planning Authority ought to be consulted on whether the proposed licensing of No. 61 to sell alcohol requires an application for a change of use.

It appears from the last accounts filed by the Applicants company that at the time they were filed there was over £200,000 worth of alcohol stored at the premises. Obviously I can not comment on the quantity as the Applicant deals in high end spirits, but there is a fire risk from alcohol and I suggest that the Fire Department should be asked to inspect the premises to ensure that there is no increased risk to the Terrace.

I suggest this is a rather unusual Application in a location where you would not expect to find a Licensed Premises. Il may be possible that this is acceptable, if there are sufficiently strong and clear restrictions so there can be no detrimental affect on the neighbours or neighbourhood and all the issues and risks have been dealt with.

I hope this assists with your consideration of the application and if there is any further in formation you require please contact me.

I am writing to make a comment in support of the above application. Until recently, my wife and I were neighbours of Mr Harden before moving a short distance away. During the time we lived there, Mr Harden was an excellent neighbour whose one-man online business selling high quality alcoholic spirits did not interfere in any way with our lives or cause us any inconvenience or disturbance. We found such a small online business carried out with total discretion an asset to our little community. Though it is a business, it cannot be characterised as loudly commercial.

I note the four criteria that apply in such cases. (1) Crime and disorder would not be an issue as no customers visit the premises and of course no alcohol is consumed by them. (2) There are similarly no issues I can see related to public safety. The spirits are kept in very good and orderly condition in the garage to the rear of the property (I have been in and seen) and the likelihood of fire I would rate as negligible, though this can of course be checked out. The garage is the other side of a secondary small private road and is not attached to the houses. (3) Public nuisance resulting from Mr Harden's strictly online business is most unlikely. Though it is true that delivery vans to Mr Harden irritate some neighbours, I cannot construe this annoyance as a public nuisance. Many delivery vans, not only to Mr. Harden, are a fact of life these days on all our roads. The private road on which twelve houses in the terrace are situated is narrow but it all works out in our experience with a bit of goodwill. The issue of the narrow private road is exacerbated because many residents park their cars permanently in front of their houses rather than in the garages to the rear of the properties, some of which it is true are rather small for the sometimes large cars people drive these days. Lastly (4) it is inconceivable that children could come to any harm as a result of Mr Harden's business as nobody knows it is there and children are few and far between in that neck of the woods.

In summary, I support the application. It is unusual, it is true, for a licensed premises to be located in such a terrace where Mr Harden and his family reside. But the business is entirely online and is completely discreet. Any issues related to delivery vans can surely be sorted out amicably and are anyway unrelated to the criteria as such for granting a public licence.
